



The PSA is a members' association for professional squash players across the world and is responsible for the organization and coordination of the men's and women's professional squash circuit and issuing of PSA World Rankings.

Membership of the PSA binds an individual to the policies, rules and regulations set forth by the PSA board in the PSA Tour Rule Book. To join PSA, simply complete the following form: https://secure.psaworldtour.com/membership.

- Creating a PSA account starts at the age of 15 years old

- You can play tournaments beforehand but would not be allowed to claim the point.

The PSA Word Tour is divided into the following:

Tournaments - PSA World Tour

The PSA World Tour features the best players from around the world in some of the most incredible locations around the globe.

Tournament tiers consist of:

- PSA World Championships

Undoubtedly the biggest prize in squash, the PSA World Championship is an annual tournament that brings 128 of the world's best players together for a week of high-intensity action as they battle it out for the right to become World Champion.

- PSA World Tour Finals

The PSA World Tour Finals is the season finale of the PSA World Tour and features a men's and women's division of eight players each. The reigning PSA World Champion and the seven PSA World Tour Platinum winners automatically qualify for the PSA World Tour Finals.

- PSA World Tour Platinum

The PSA World Tour Platinum tier is the elite level of the PSA World Tour and contains up to eight high-profile squash tournaments which attract the world's best players and provide the most demanding competition across 48-player draws. They are the focus of

the PSA's global TV coverage and are all broadcast on the online squash channel, SQUASHTV and on the platforms of PSA's broadcast partners.

- PSA World Tour Gold, Silver, Bronze:

These tournaments showcase some of the best players and biggest tournaments in stunning locations. PSA World Tour Gold, Silver and Bronze tournaments feature a 24-player draw.

The PSA Challenger Tour tournaments form the backbone of the tour and are the entry point for up-and-coming professionals progressing through to a more international level of competition. PSA Challenger
Tour tournaments can feature a men's and/or women's division.

There are 4 levels of PSA Challenger events:

- PSA Challenger Tour 30
- PSA Challenger Tour 20
- PSA Challenger Tour 10
- PSA Challenger Tour 5

The WSF & PSA Satellite tournaments are designed to provide a pathway for junior and national players to join the professional squash circuit.

The WSF & PSA Satellite Tour includes the following tournaments:

- WSF & PSA National Championships
- WSF & PSA Junior tournaments
- WSF & PSA Satellite

Satellite tournaments are entry level tournaments that happen locally at any club and can be organized by any coach, owner, or even a player by informing the PSA beforehand. They are designed to attract young talent interested in playing professional squash. Signing up to these tournaments usually happens by contacting the promoter and paying the entry fees.

Can I play PSA tournaments while I am in college?

- Sure, thing you can, by contacting your school coach, playing over the summer, and managing your time well. Examples: Amanda Sobhy, Georgina Kennedy, Youssef Ibrahim – Victor Crouin. Olivia Fiechter

Am I allowed to earn money and sign sponsorship deals?

- Yes, to the sponsorship deals according to the NCAA rule change in the summer of 2021.
- Prize money will depend on your own school's internal policies.

Wildcards:

- Wildcards are given by US Squash and local promoters to boost the ranking of a young and talented junior squash player interested in tackling the PSA.
